

NEIGHBORHOOD SNAPSHOT: Metcalfe Park

The Metcalfe Park community in Milwaukee is one of the eight neighborhoods in four cities – Flint, Fresno, Memphis and Milwaukee – to receive a BNCP grant. Launched in 2012 as part of the federal Neighborhood Revitalization Initiative (NRI), BNCP seeks to catalyze community-driven change in neighborhoods that have historically faced barriers to revitalization.

BNCP focuses on building <u>community capacity</u>: **the knowledge, skills, relationships, interactions and organizational resources** that enable residents, civic leaders, the public and private sectors and local organizations to transform neighborhoods into places of opportunity. Each BNCP neighborhood has identified capacity building priorities, which they will develop through implementing a "learn while doing" project and creating a revitalization plan.

Capacity Building Priorities

Metcalfe Park has identified the following capacity priorities:

A Community Process: Creating a steering committee that represents community members, business leaders, community organizations, faith-based organizations and other stakeholders and focuses on uniting the neighborhood across culture, class, and power.

Resident Engagement: Ensuring that the neighborhood partnership is representative of the neighborhood and that residents have access to community data, skill building and leadership opportunities that will allow them to drive community decision making.

Accountable Partnerships: Expanding partners to address the priorities of the neighborhood.

Financing: Building relationships with funders, learning what funding streams exist (private, public and nonprofit) and developing a process to strategically leverage and align resources.

"Learning While Doing" Project

Metcalfe Park is currently in the process of developing a "learn while doing" project, which will focus on improving conditions related to one targeted result area in the neighborhood, such as education, employment, safety or housing.

Key Players

A lead agency and a cross-sector partnership in Milwaukee are working directly with anchor partners in Metcalfe Park to support neighborhood capacity building and revitalization.
